

Sheltered Count

A sheltered homeless person/household resides in: A supervised publicly or privately operated sheltered designated to provide temporary living arrangement (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state or local governmental programs).

- Sheltered PITC numbers were taken from HMIS and include: Emergency Shelters, Safe Havens and Transitional Housing
- Over 60 agencies enter data into HMIS that was used for the sheltered PITC



Unsheltered Count:

An unsheltered homeless person/household resides in: A place not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, or on the street.

- 4,261 Square Miles
- Over 2,000 Miles of Roads
- County Population:3,317,749 Million
- 5Th Most Populated County in the Country














Race + Ethnicity Demographics






Age of First Instance of Homelessness

Chronic Homelessness Breakdown

Breakdown	2017	2018	% Change

Sheltered	389	771	+98%


- The 98% increase in sheltered chronically homeless correlates with the opening of the three bridge shelters.
- The three bridge shelters created a 27% increase in Emergency Shelter beds that prioritized individuals who are chronically homeless.
- 25% of San Diego County's homeless population are considered chronically homeless.



"Where were you sleeping the night before incarceration?"




Local Question - Origin of Homelessness


